



tiglio from the music room! So far this year all grades have been working on their singing skills. The younger grades are working on basics such as fast/slow, loud/quiet, and higher/lower. The older grades have been working hard on learning new solfege notes (think do, re, mi...)

All grades also perform rhythms in many different ways, moving, clapping, patting, speaking, singing, and writing. As for our Normandy choirs, we have performances quickly approaching. On Wednesday, December 6th, we have a day performance and an evening performance for both choirs. On Sunday, December 3rd, the Troubadours (4-6th grade choir) have been invited to sing at the Denver Center for the Performing Arts before a Colorado Children's Chorale concert! It is great working with such musical kids. They make music at Normandy a joy and delight.

ART NEWS

Greetings from the art room! All grades are progressing nicely in art and are focusing on different concepts. I wanted to give you a brief rundown of what each grade level has done and will be doing in the near future.

First grade: The first trimester focuses on how students can use elements and principles of art to tell a story in different contexts. Soon we will shift gears and focus on sequence and pattern.

Second grade: The major focus for second grade has been the concept of showing overlapping. Soon they will begin a unit on expressive portraits.

Third grade: Much of the first couple of months has focused on how color is related to different emotions we feel. Currently, they have begun making an altered book and then will move onto learning about public art.

Fourth grade: Learning about how artists use abstraction in art has been the focus the first two months of school. Soon we will begin talking about landscapes and how they are influenced by an idea or emotion.

Fifth grade: They have been learning about how elements and principles are used to develop an interesting composition. They will be starting a sculpture unit that focuses on movement and proportion soon.

Sixth grade: Sixth grade started off the year with a unit based on a metaphor that describes them and are currently working on creating a personal logo using Google Draw. Following this will be a unit based on color and how we relate to and perceive colors.

Physical Education

The weather in CO is always changing! I take any opportunity to get the kids outside for some fresh air and lots of activity. Luckily we have spent most of the month of October doing so! Soccer and Capture the Piggie are a couple favorites. Both games allow the kids to practice both offensive and defensive strategies. It is always interesting to see which position each students prefers.

The kids have also completed their first Pacer Test. This test is about endurance and pacing. It allows the students to run long, but not necessarily fast. The students set goals and try to improve each time we run.

Jump Rope for Heart is underway and the first week has been a HUGE success! We are learning to drink more water, stay away from sodium, eat fruits and veggies, stay away from tobacco, and of course, stay active in order to keep our hearts healthy! Thank you to all who have participated, so far!

Jeffco Healthy Schools

Family and Classroom Shared Food Resource

Overview

As required by law, Jeffco's Wellness Policy and Guidelines include standards for foods shared during the school day starting in 17/18 unless otherwise noted.

If food is offered at school celebrations, at least HALF should include healthier options.

Schools or classrooms can also opt for no food or only healthier food!



Ideas for Implementation:

- Inform teachers and parents about providing balanced options for celebrations
- Create a sign-up sheet that includes at least half healthier options (don't forget to address allergies)
- petermine other non-food options for celebrating

Why?

1/2 Tealthy Improve Nutrition

Address Allergies

Promote Equity Protect Family Decisions on Food

The foods we share can teach students about nutrition and balance.

To define healthier options, schools can:

Follow district definition in the Guidelines*

OR

Create and document their own definition



Schools will not use food or beverages as rewards for academic performance or good behavior.



Ideas for Implementation:

- Utilize non-food rewards for the whole class, such as extra physical activity or recess time, games, a fun dress-up day, playing music
- Limit individual rewards and focus on clear expectations and positive words for all students
- Utilize other rewards such as being a line leader, sitting with a friend, choosing a movement break or game, additional work credit



Starting in 2018-19 (or sooner), student birthdays should only be recognized with non-food celebrations.

Many schools already have similar policies in place.

Ideas for Implementation:

- Clearly communicate these standards with families and consider engaging family groups
- Determine other non-food options for celebrating birthdays
- Ask families to not bring in food to share (this does not apply to food for individual consumption)



Any other shared food should be selected judiciously, taking into consideration the nutritional value of the food being served, Jeffco's goal of promoting healthy dietary habits, and the frequency of use.

Emergency Situations at School





Jeffco Public Schools is committed to ensuring the safety and security of our students, staff, and visitors.

Take a moment to review this quide to ensure you are prepared in the event of an emergency situation at school.

What are the types of actions a school might take in the event of an emergency?

Jeffco Public Schools follows the Standard Response Protocol established by the LLove U Guys Foundation.

LOCKDOWN

Ordered when there is a threat INSIDE the building. Students and staff are secured IN the school. School staff does not communicate during a lock-down. Parents are not allowed on site during a lockdown.

SHELTER

Ordered when personal protection is necessary from dangerous weather conditions such as a tornado, blizzard, or hail. May also be ordered in the event of a hazmat situation in the area.

EVACUATION

Ordered when people must exit the building due to unsafe circumstances. If student pickup or off-site reunification is required, instructions will be communicated by the district.

LOCKOUT

Ordered when there is an issue OUTSIDE the building, most often due to police activity in the area that could pose a threat, or a wild animal nearby. All exterior doors are locked while "business as usual" continues inside the school.

- Some situations may require a combination of the actions described above.
- School and district staff train yearly on emergency protocols and situation management.
- Students take part in drills throughout each school year.

What type of emergencies might impact my child's school? Which actions are taken?

Severe weather - Schools may Shelter until weather passes; could delay release of students at end of day until safe to exit building.

Fire or Hazmat Situation in the Area - Evacuation or Shelter, depending on location and severity of fire/hazmat issue.

Threat of Violence or Weapon on a Person - Lockout, Lockdown, or Evacuation, depending on the situation.

Intruder - Requires an immediate Lockdown; an emergency notification will be sent to parents by the district with any instructions.

Police Activity in the Area - Usually a Lockout; action may be taken at the direction of a law enforcement agency or any staff member at the school.

What do I need to know, do, and not do?

- · If you are visiting a school and an emergency situation occurs, follow protocol along with students and staff.
- We know families want information right away. Our experience has taught us initial information is almost always incorrect. Please know, our
 security and administrative staff are working hard to determine what the real situation is and will communicate with families as soon as
 information is verified as accurate and any steps to take have been determined.
- Do not call the school or security staff, as they are working on the situation and ensuring your student's safety. Do not go to the school; this
 may interfere with procedures. Only public safety personnel will be allowed in/near a school during an emergency situation.
- We understand you may want to communicate with your student during an emergency, however, please refrain from calling his/her cell
 phone, as it may prevent him/her from hearing important, possibly life-saving, information or instructions.
- It is <u>vital</u> parents and guardians keep their information updated in JeffcoConnect (www.jeffcopublicschools.org/family_portal). We will utilize
 email, text messaging, and phone calls to communicate with you.
- The fastest way to get information in an emergency situation is to follow us on Twitter (@JeffcoSchoolsCo) and Facebook
 (@JeffcoPublicSchoolsColorado). It is our <u>first</u> and <u>fastest</u> means of getting messages out. Also, check our website for alerts posted on the main page.

Food and Nutrition Services A La Carte Offerings 2017-18

Jeffco Food and Nutrition Services offers a la carte offerings daily to our students. A la Carte include single items offered in addition to or separate from the reimbursable meal such as: bottled beverages, milk, extra entrees, snack items, etc. Snacks must meet all Federal regulations regarding nutritional standards. These standards include:

Calories	Snacks Items: less than or equal to 200 calories Entrée Items: less than or equal to 350 calories
Sodium	•Snack Items: less than or equal to 230 mg •Entrée Items: less than or equal to 480 mg
Total Fat	• <35% Calories from Fat
Saturated Fat	• <10% Calories from Saturated Fat
Trans Fat	Zero grams per serving
Sugar	• <35% Sugar (by weight)

Snack items must be whole grain or the 1st ingredient must be a fruit, vegetable, dairy or protein food.

We understand and support each family's decision to allow or not allow their child(ren) to purchase additional a la carte items. If you choose to limit your child's purchase of a la carte, please let us know your direction below. Do not complete if no changes are needed.
