


As you may have read in our last Weekly Update our Columbine Area elementary schools, along with Ken Caryl Middle School, proposed a change to the Early Release Days for the 18-19 school year. Currently, Early Release Days are scheduled as half days for students. When students leave, staff members engage in professional learning opportunities. During the 18-19 school year those days listed as Early Release Days will be full non-contact days for all students in the Columbine Area elementary schools and at Ken Caryl Middle School. Students will not come to school on these days, however, area staff will participate in a full day of professional development. Our area schools will use this time for K-8 professional learning, as well as on-site training for our individual staff members. Some parents have asked about how this decision was made. At our Area Accountability meeting in January, the accountability committee members from each school discussed the benefits of changing these contact days for both families and schools. Trends noticed throughout the year included a lower attendance rate on half day early release days, the difficulty of finding day care for students, the need for more professional development and time for planning at school sites, and the lack of time we have to meet as an articulation area to align our instruction. As an articulation area, we decided that all stakeholders could benefit from a full release day, rather than a half-day. This decision resulted in five non-contact days for students next year: September 21, 2018, November 2, 2018, February 15, 2018, March 15, 2019, and April 26, 2019. If you have any questions or concerns about these days, please feel free to contact me. I am happy to answer questions or talk about how our area representatives made this decision. We appreciate your support with this change.

We are finishing the school year with Lacrosse and learning how to cradle, scoop, throw and catch with the long handled sticks. The students will also be completing their 2nd Pacer test with the hopes that their aerobic capacity has improved from first semester.

"Aerobic capacity is the maximal amount of physiological work that an individual can do as measured by oxygen consumption," in other words, how our body uses oxygen during exercise. The goal is that the students are staying active during our daily activities so that their bodies use oxygen more efficiently as the year goes on.

Music Notes

Mrs. Rodriguez

We are wrapping up our year in music. The 6th grade is rehearsing for our 6th grade program on Monday, May 21st. It is based off a book called Wherever You Go by Pat Zietlow Miller. This is a nice farewell for the 6th graders as they embark on a new journey to middle school.

Grades 3-5 have been working on recorder songs. I am so incredibly proud of their progress this year. It is encouraging to see so many students take their recorders home to practice. Their growth is quite evident.

Grade 2 began learning a new rhythm, 4 sixteenth notes. We call this rhythm tika-tika. Some classes in Second grade starting singing in a 2-part round. This is when one group begins a song while a second group begins the song a little after the first group. Lastly, second graders have been showing 4-beat meter with the bodies while singing. This is music that has 4 beats in a measure.

Grade 1 is really growing musically. We learned how to read quarter notes and eighth notes in music, which we call ta and ti-ti. We also can identify and show high and low sounds with our voices. Currently, we call our high sound "so" and our low sound "mi," which comes from the system of reading music called solfege. It allows for musicians to mentally hear the relationship of pitches without needing to know the exact note name. All grade levels learn solfege, and each year we build more notes into our skill set.

Technology

Hello Normandy Families,

We wrap up state testing this week and move into our final district assessment next week. Please encourage your student(s) to try their best on these last two assessments. One of the reasons we really like the district MAP tests is the immediate feedback we get from the test data. Teachers can quickly see where student's strengths are and also put support in place, as needed.

The end of the year in the library is quickly approaching. The district decides our final due date and has made that May 10th this year. All library books are due on this day so we can retrieve everything, complete the needed inventory and prepare to receive textbooks soon after. Help your students get all library returned by the 10th.

The other large end of year project happening in the library is getting our new iPads and Chromebooks set up for classrooms. Kindergarten and first grade will each have a set of iPads to keep in their classroom. Second through sixth grade will continue to use Chromebooks and each of these classrooms will have a couple new laptops that can be used as print devices, or as needed. Our students' technology skills greatly improved this year. You can support their tech use by encouraging them to create and write in Google Apps during the summer. Their @jeffcoschools.us domain is a Google account and will work anywhere.

Artistic Endeavors Mr. Keith McConnell

The following information explains current lessons at each grade level.

First grade: Printmaking!! First grade is learning about the various types of printmaking and the process a printmaker goes through. They are doing a simple version with sponges and animal stencils.

Second grade: They are in the beginning stages of a collage landscape inspired by the Austrian artist Friedensreich Hundertwasser.

Third Grade: Third grade are doing weaving on clay looms inspired by Native Americans.

Fourth grade: They are using a monochromatic color scheme, and making tints, shades, and tones of a color in an animal painting.

Fifth Grade: Fifth grade is currently studying why artists use one point perspective and are using this concept to create a composition in one point perspective using their name.

Sixth grade: Sixth graders analyzed narrative paintings using VTS (Visual Thinking Strategies) and developed a narrative accordion book based on a current or future event in their life.

A special congratulations goes out to Tyler Sternberg. Tyler is in fourth grade and recently had a painting in the Annual Red Rocks Show. Tyler's painting was selected for the School Purchase Award so her art will be framed and become a permanent piece at Normandy Elementary!


